BUSH FIRE PROTECTION

Now is the time to undertake maintenance around your property and home in preparation of the bush fire season.

Most people connect bush fire threat with close proximity to dense vegetation (e.g. Goonoowigall Reserve, Clive State Forest, etc.). Whilst these areas pose a significant threat, a bush fire can also be sustained within grass paddocks and can spread long distances via wind blown embers. Therefore, a large number of properties within the Inverell Shire are at risk from a bush fire attack.

To prepare for the bush fire season, it is recommended that property owners:

- · Maintain asset protection zones;
- Ensure that a water supply dedicated to fire fighting is available;
- · Maintain any fire trails; and
- Mend any holes in the sub-floor, window or gutter guards.

The New South Wales Rural Fire Service provide useful information in relation to bush fire protection. Attached to this bulletin is the Fact Sheet—Bush Fire and Your Home, which outlines maintenance activities to be undertaken around your house and garden.

Please remember—not all homes can be protected. Your safety is always the first priority. Additional information in relation to bush fire protection can be found at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au.

TEMPORARY SWIMMING POOLS

As we approach the warmer months, the use of swimming pools will start to increase. Accordingly, residents are reminded that any pool that is capable of being filled with water to a depth of 300 millimetres (30cm) or more requires a pool fence (child-resistant barrier). This includes an inflatable, demountable or portable swimming pool.

Depending on the size, capacity and location of the temporary swimming, you may also require development consent from Council.

Many of these pools can be purchased over the counter at various retailers. It is always best to contact Council to check the requirements before making your purchase.

Bush Fire and Your Home

PREPARE YOUR HOME AND PROPERTY FOR BUSH FIRES

These maintenance tips may help prevent burning embers destroying your house:

- ☐ Install metal gutter guards
- Repair damaged or missing tiles on the roof
- ☐ Install fine metal mesh screens on windows and doors
- ☐ Fit seals around doors and windows to eliminate gaps
- Enclose the areas under the house
- ☐ Repair or cover gaps in external walls
- ☐ Attach a fire sprinkler system to gutters

DID YOU KNOW

Not all homes can be defended - your safety is always the first priority.



- keep lawns short and gardens well maintained
- cut back trees and shrubs overhanging buildings
- clean up fallen leaves, twigs and debris around the property
 - have hoses long enough to reach
- around your house
- if you have a pool, tank or dam, put a Static Water Supply (SWS) sign on your property entrance
- check that your insurance is adequate
- complete your Bush Fire Survival Plan and up to date available at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au.

In a bush fire many houses are destroyed through ember attack, when burning twigs and leaves carried by the wind land on or around the house. Even houses away from the direct path of the fire can be affected.

Look for the places embers could start fires - on the roof, under the floor and around windows and doors - and take action to prevent them.
