



## Chat with Logie winner Costa Georgiadis Live online via Zoom


In the comfort of your own home



# NEW BOOKS

## ***Happy Hour* by Jacquie Byron (AF BYRO)**

Australian Fiction

Gin in one hand, paintbrush in the other, Franny Calderwood has turned her back on the world, or at least the world she used to love. Having lost her husband, Frank, in tragic circumstances three years earlier, 65-year-old Franny copes the only way she knows how: by removing herself completely from the life she had before. Franny lives a life of decadent seclusion, with only her two dogs, Whiskey and Soda, a stuffed cat, and the memory of Frank for company.

Then the Salernos move in next door. The troubled but charming trio - beleaguered mother Sallyanne, angry teenager Dee and the eccentric eight-year-old Josh - cannot help but pull Franny into the drama of their lives. But despite her fixation with independence, Franny's wisecracks and culinary experiments hide considerable trauma and pain, and when her eccentric behaviour has life-threatening consequences she faces a reckoning of sorts. Yes, Frank is dead, but did the woman he loved have to perish with him?




## ***The Coward* by Stephen Aryan (AF ARYA)**

Kell Kressia is a legend, a celebrity, a hero. Aged just seventeen, he set out on an epic quest with a band of wizened fighters to slay the Ice Lich and save the world. He returned victorious, but alone.

Ten years have passed and Kell lives a quiet life, while stories of his heroism are told in taverns all across the land. But now a new terror has arisen in the north - something has taken up residence in the Lich's abandoned castle beyond the Frozen Circle, and the ice is beginning to creep south once more.

For the second time, Kell is called upon to take up his famous sword, Slayer, and battle the forces of darkness. But he has a terrible secret. Kell was never a hero - he was just lucky. Everyone puts their faith in Kell the Legend, but he's just a coward who has no intention of risking his life for anyone.




### ***The Perfect Family* by Robyn Harding (AF HARD)**

Psychological Fiction

Thomas and Viv Adler have a picture perfect family. Affluent and attractive, with two well-mannered kids almost out of the nest, they live in a beautiful house in a well-to-do neighbourhood. Their jobs are fulfilling; their children are thriving; the world is their oyster.

Until one morning, when they wake up to find that their house and car have been pelted with eggs. Thomas dismisses it as the work of a few out-of-control kids, but when a smoke bomb is tossed on their front lawn, and the tires on their BMW are punctured, he begins to worry. Unable to identify the perpetrators, they are helpless as the assaults escalate. The police assure them that this is just the work of bored teenagers, but no one in the Adler family believes it. After all, each of them has a secret - kept not only from the outside world but from each other.

As the Adlers grapple with their guilt, fear and shame, the assaults grow deadly. Their 'perfect' façade is crumbling, and it may be too late for any of them to do anything about it.



## Gillian Flynn

Gillian Flynn was born in Kansas City, Missouri to two community-college professors - her mother taught reading; her father, film. Thus she spent an inordinate amount of her youth nosing through books and watching movies. She has happy memories of having 'A Wrinkle in Time' pried from her hands at the dinner table, and also of seeing *Alien*, *Psycho* and *Bonnie and Clyde* at a questionable age (like, seven). It was a good childhood.

In high-school, she worked strange jobs that required her to do things like wrap and unwrap hams, or dress up as a giant yogurt cone. A yogurt cone who wore a tuxedo. Why the tuxedo? It was a question that would haunt her for years.

For college, she headed to the University of Kansas (go Jayhawks), where she received her undergraduate degrees in English and journalism.

After a two-year stint writing about human resources for a trade magazine in California, Flynn moved to Chicago. There she earned her master's degree in journalism from Northwestern University and discovered that she was way too wimpy to make it as a crime reporter.

On the other hand, she was a movie geek with a journalism degree - so she moved to New York City and joined *Entertainment Weekly* magazine, where she wrote happily for 10 years, visiting film sets around the world (to New Zealand for *The Lord of the Rings*, to Prague for *The Brothers Grimm*, to somewhere off the highway in Florida for *Jackass: The Movie*). During her last four years at EW, Flynn was the TV critic (all-time best TV show: *The Wire*).

Flynn's 2006 debut novel, the literary mystery 'Sharp Objects', was an Edgar Award finalist and the winner of two of Britain's Dagger Awards - the first book ever to win multiple Daggerys in one year. The book is now an HBO® limited series starring Amy Adams.



Flynn's second novel, the 2009 New York Times bestseller 'Dark Places', was a New Yorker Reviewers' Favorite, Weekend TODAY Top Summer Read, Publishers Weekly Best Book of 2009, and Chicago Tribune Favorite Fiction choice. In 2015, the movie adaptation starring Charlize Theron was released.

Flynn's third novel, 'Gone Girl', was an international sensation and a runaway hit that has spent more than one hundred weeks on the New York Times bestseller lists. 'Gone Girl' was named one of the best books of the year by People Magazine and Janet Maslin at the New York Times. Nominated for both the Edgar Award and the Anthony Award for Best Novel, Flynn wrote the screenplay for David Fincher's 2014 adaptation of 'Gone Girl' for the big screen, starring Ben Affleck and Rosamund Pike.

Her newest release, 'The Grownup', is an Edgar Award-winning short story and an homage to the classic ghost story. Universal has optioned the rights to 'The Grownup'.

Flynn's work has been published in forty-one languages. She lives in Chicago with her husband, Brett Nolan, their children, and a giant black cat named Roy. In theory she is working on her next novel. In reality she is possibly playing Ms. Pac-Man in her basement lair.



## Book Review

'Educated' by Tara Westover

Tara Westover, one of seven children, was raised in a strict Mormon family in the Idaho mountains. Her father, an antigovernment fundamentalist, lived off the grid, stockpiled for the end of the world, and put his children to work in his scrapyard, often at great danger, instead of letting them attend school. Her mother, despite a brain injury left untreated, sold homeopathic medicine; one brother became violent and abusive. No one received medical care; none of the children had heard of the Holocaust or the Civil Rights Movement. Still, one brother went to Brigham Young University, and when he returned, regaling her with the larger world, Tara taught herself enough to get there. A natural scholar encouraged by her professors, she excelled at future endeavors at Brigham Young, Cambridge, and Harvard. Despite her stifling hardships, Tara remained loyal to her family--justified or not--as she found the will to change her life.

In Book 9 of Homer's '*The Odyssey*' we meet the Cyclopes, the race of one-eyed giants who live apart from each other in isolated mountain caves. As Richmond Lattimore's translation has it, "Each one is the law for his own wives and children, and cares nothing about the others." Odysseus exploits this weakness in his well-known escape from the giant's lair. "*Nobody is my name*," the epic hero tells the giant, and after Odysseus blinds him, the Cyclops calls out to his brothers for help: "*Nobody is killing me by force or treachery*." Lacking a common bond, the other Cyclopes are easily tricked, and no one comes to his aid. The real "nobody," it turns out, is not Odysseus but the Cyclops himself. For how can he have an identity without a community?

In '*Educated: A Memoir*', Tara Westover recounts her own kind of Cyclopean upbringing in rural Idaho in the 1990s. "Feral" might be a better word for it. She and her six older siblings were raised on the side of Buck's Peak by a fundamentalist Mormon family of survivalists. Her bipolar father stockpiled weapons and fuel in anticipation of the government's eventual collapse. The family sustained itself by selling herbal remedies and working in their own junkyard, and much of the book is a litany of the wounds the author and her siblings received there, from flying exhaust pipes and exploding gas tanks. Though more than a few injuries were life-threatening, none received treatment from doctors or hospitals--herbal tinctures and salves were all her father allowed. Westover's father kept his children out of school, and several of them, including the author, did not receive birth certificates. As far as the outside world was concerned, Tara Westover was a nobody.

The Westover children clearly had limited options for their future. Their work in the family business occupied most of their time, and homeschooling consists of periodically leafing through encyclopedias and grade-school science textbooks. Yet the outside world still makes its way into the family home. Lying on the floor at her older brother's feet, listening to his CD of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, the young Tara Westover's education begins:

*"The hymn was familiar to me--we'd sung it at church, a chorus of mismatched voices raised in worship--but this was different. It was worshipful, but it was also something else, something to do with study, discipline, and collaboration. Something I didn't yet understand."*

Throughout her teen years, Westover suffers tremendous physical and psychological abuse at the hands of her older brother Shawn which often left her with broken bones and bruises. When she brings the abuse to her father's attention, however, he refuses to acknowledge it, and eventually, the entire family, except for one brother, turns on her. Isolated and on the verge of psychological collapse while on a fellowship at Harvard, Westover begins to doubt her own memory--perhaps she imagined the abuse? After one particularly humiliating incident that involves Shawn dragging her through a parking lot, she decides, for the first time, to record the abuse in her journal--not just in the "vague, shadowy language" she usually uses to conceal the abuse from herself, but in terms of what actually happened. This action, she later writes, "would change everything."

'*Educated*' is Tara Westover's account of becoming an individual through paideia. She ventures out into the world to discover her identity, and finds it only by making herself vulnerable to the truth, no matter where it lies or how painful it is. Her memoir provides a captivating account of her gradual discovery of an essentially Catholic truth--that we exist in relation to others and to the world around us.

## Book Week Reading Challenge Winners

What an interesting year 2021 has been for all of us. With lockdowns and changes to the way families move about their community, we chose to introduce a new technology into the library that allows reading to be tracked. To promote reading and literacy in our youth, and allow families to familiarize themselves with this new product called Beanstack, we introduced a Book Week Reading Challenge.

The purpose of the challenge was to encourage youth to explore the books nominated for this year's Book Week, as they celebrate Australian authors and illustrators, but more generally to keep our kids engaged with books. The major prize of the challenge was a family pass to Green Valley Farm.

The challenge ran from April to August, and was for participants aged between 3-17 years old. They were encouraged to read books, write reviews and complete activities based on the short listed book week titles.

34 children registered for the challenge and 26 of these went to complete it which means they read at least 1 book. We are pleased to say most did not stop there. Nine children read 1-10 books, seven read 10-50 books, six read 50-100 books and four read over 100 books. In total 1635 books were read by the end of the challenge.

Additionally 46 reviews were written and five children rose to the challenge of reading all six shortlisted books from a book week category and then ranking them in their own order of preference.

We are very pleased to see so many children and families embracing this challenge and using Beanstack which is available to all library members.





Every 3 weeks, library staff are able to deliver items of your choice to you.


We have a wide range of items available, from books, music, DVD's, magazines, large print, talking books, mysteries, romance, westerns and more.

### **Getting the most from the Library Catalogue**

#### **Finding things on the Catalogue**

- \* Go to [www.inverell.nsw.gov.au](http://www.inverell.nsw.gov.au) Click on 'Public Library' - Click on 'Library Catalogue'
- \* You can start by simply typing what you are looking for in the "Search Term" box.
- \* It is possible to search by TITLE (words in the name of the item), AUTHOR (words in the authors' name), SUBJECT (words that appear in the description of what the item is about), KEYWORD (words that appear anywhere in the information about the item) or SERIES (words that appear in the name of the series the item belongs to).
- \* Try to watch your spelling and avoid using abbreviations.
- \* Click on the magnifying glass.
- \* Your results will show the number available in each format. Eg Books View all 400 items
- \* Click on the title/author of the item of interest.
- \* You should be able to see if any items are available.
- \* Click on blue circle next to "More Details" to check the availability or to reserve it if it is on loan.

If you don't get any results, check your spelling, try searching a different way- try Keyword instead of Title, or use different words to describe the Subject (Poultry for chooks, Cookery for baking).
