Origins of Remembrance Day

Why is this day special to Australians?

At 11am on 11 November 1918 the guns on the Western Front fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare. The allied armies had driven the German invaders back, having inflicted heavy defeats upon them over the preceding four months. In November the Germans called for an armistice (suspension of fighting) in order to secure a peace settlement. They accepted allied terms that amounted to unconditional surrender.

On the second anniversary of the armistice in 1920 the commemoration was given added significance when it became a funeral, with the return of the remains of an unknown soldier from the battlefields of the Western Front. Unknown soldiers were interred with full military honours in Westminster Abbey in London and at the Arc de Triumph in Paris. The entombment in London attracted over one million people within a week to pay their respects at the unknown soldier's tomb. Most other allied nations adopted the tradition of entombing unknown soldiers over the following decade.

After the end of the Second World War, the Australian and British governments changed the name to Remembrance Day. Armistice Day was no longer an appropriate title for a day which would commemorate all war dead.

In Australia on the 75th anniversary of the armistice in 1993 Remembrance Day ceremonies again became the focus of national attention. The remains of an unknown Australian soldier, exhumed from a First World War military cemetery in France, were ceremonially entombed in the Memorial's Hall of Memory. Remembrance Day ceremonies were conducted simultaneously in towns and cities all over the country, culminating at the moment of burial at 11 am and coinciding with the traditional two minutes' silence. This ceremony, which touched a chord across the Australian nation, re-established Remembrance Day as a significant day of commemoration.

Four years later, in 1997, Governor-General Sir William Deane issued a proclamation formally declaring 11 November to be Remembrance Day, urging all Australians to observe one minute's silence at 11 am on 11 November each year to remember those who died or suffered for Australia's cause in all wars and armed conflicts.



***At The End Of The Day* by Liz Byrski (AF BYRS)**

Australian Fiction.

When Mim Squires and Mathias Vander are stranded together on a disrupted flight home to Perth, they are surprised to find that they have much in common. Mim owns a bookshop, Mathias is a writer, and both are at turning points in their lives. Mim's childhood polio is taking a toll on her life. Mathias is contemplating a cross-continent move to be nearer to his daughter.

But life back in Perth is not smooth sailing, with their respective family members going through their own upheavals. As Mim and Mathias both struggle to adjust to the challenges of being in their late seventies, secrets from the past that neither wishes to face rise to the surface, challenging their long-held beliefs in their independence and singularity.

At the end of the day, can they muster the wisdom and the courage they need to change?




***How To Fail At Flirting* by Denise Williams (AF WILL)**

Chick Lit.

For one night only, Naya's friends convince her to shed her frumpy cardigan for an evening on the town. For once, she'll forget about her demanding job and, with the help of her new to-do list, practice flirting with a charming stranger.

Jake might be just what Naya never knew she was looking for...He's sexy, he makes her laugh and he challenges Naya to rebuild her lost confidence.

But the best things in life are never easy, and the complicated strings around dating Jake might just destroy her career. Naya has two options: she can protect her professional reputation and return to her old life, or she can flirt with the unknown and stay with the person who makes her feel like she's finally living again.



***A Narrow Door* by Joanne Harris (AF HARR)**

Psychological Fiction.

It's an incendiary moment for St Oswald's school. For the first time in its history, a headmistress is in power, the gates opening to girls.

Rebecca Buckfast has spilled blood to reach this position. Barely forty, she is just starting to reap the harvest of her ambition. As the new regime takes on the old guard, the ground shifts.

And with it, the remains of a body are discovered.

But Rebecca is here to make her mark. She'll bury the past so deep it will evade even her own memory, just like she has done before. After all, you can't keep a good woman down.

***Cloud Cuckoo Land* by Anthony Doerr (AF DOER)**


Historical/Sci-Fi Fiction

Thirteen-year-old Anna, an orphan, lives inside the formidable walls of Constantinople in a house of women who make their living embroidering the robes of priests. Restless and insatiably curious, Anna learns to read, and in this ancient city, famous for its libraries, she finds a book, the story of Aethon, who longs to be turned into a bird so that he can fly to a utopian paradise in the sky. This she reads to her ailing sister as the walls of the only place she has known are bombarded in the great siege of Constantinople. Outside the walls is Omeir, a village boy, miles from home, conscripted with his beloved oxen into the invading army. His path and Anna's will cross.

Five hundred years later, in a library in Idaho, octogenarian Zeno, who learned Greek as a prisoner of war, rehearses five children in a play adaptation of Aethon's story, preserved against all odds through centuries. Tucked among the library shelves is a bomb, planted by a troubled, idealistic teenager, Seymour. This is another siege. And in a not-so-distant future, on the interstellar ship Argos, Konstance is alone in a vault, copying on scraps of sacking the story of Aethon, told to her by her father. She has never set foot on our planet.

Doerr's dazzling imagination transports us to worlds so dramatic and immersive that we forget, for a time, our own. Dedicated to "the librarians then, now, and in the years to come, '*Cloud Cuckoo Land*' is a beautiful and redemptive novel about stewardship-of the book, of the Earth, of the human heart.

Sara Paretsky



Before there was Lisbeth Salander or Stephanie Plum, there was V.I. Warshawski. Sara Paretsky revolutionized the mystery world in 1982 when she introduced V.I. in *Indemnity Only*. By creating a believable investigator with the grit and the smarts to tackle problems on the mean streets, Paretsky challenged a genre in which women typically were either vamps or victims. Hailed by critics and readers, *Indemnity Only* was followed by nineteen more best-selling Warshawski novels. The *New York Times* writes that Paretsky “always makes the top of the list when people talk about female operatives,” while Publishers Weekly says, “Among today’s PIs, nobody comes close to Warshawski.”

Called “passionate” and “electrifying,” V.I. reflects her creator’s own passion for social justice. As a contributor to the *New York Times* and the *Guardian* newspapers, and a speaker at such venues as the Library of Congress and Oxford University, Paretsky is an impassioned advocate for those on society’s margins. After chairing the school’s first Commission on the Status of Women as a Kansas undergraduate, Paretsky worked as a community organizer on Chicago’s South Side during the turbulent race riots of 1966. More recently, Paretsky served with then-state senator Obama on the board of Thresholds, which serves Chicago’s mentally ill homeless. She has mentored teens in Chicago’s most troubled schools, and works closely with literacy and reproductive rights groups.

Not only has Paretsky’s own work broken barriers, she has also helped open doors for other women. In 1986 she created Sisters in Crime, a worldwide organization to support women crime writers, which earned her Ms. Magazine’s 1987 Woman of the Year award. More accolades followed: the British Crime Writers awarded her the Cartier Diamond Dagger for lifetime achievement; *Blacklist* won the Gold Dagger from the British Crime Writers for best novel of 2004, and she has received the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters from several different universities. The actress Kathleen Turner played V.I. Warshawski in the movie of that name and Paretsky’s work is celebrated in Pamela Beere Briggs’s documentary, *Women of Mystery*. Today Sara Paretsky’s books are published in 30 countries.

She detailed her journey from Kansas farm-girl to *New York Times* bestseller in her 2007 memoir, *Writing in an Age of Silence*, which was a National Book Critics Circle Award finalist. In addition, Paretsky has written two highly-acclaimed stand-alone novels, *Ghost Country*, used in many seminary classrooms, and *Bleeding Kansas*, set in the part of rural Kansas where Paretsky grew up. She has published two collections of her own short stories, most recently *Love & Other Crimes*, and edited four other anthologies.

Like her fictional detective, Paretsky lives and dies with the Cubs, runs Chicago’s lakefront with her golden retriever, and loves to sing, taking part in community musicals. Paretsky lives on Chicago’s south side with her husband, a member of the University of Chicago’s Fermi Institute.




Book Review

Fallout by Sara Paretsky

V.I. Warshawski's impossible god-daughter Bernie convinces her to look for August, a young film-maker who has disappeared. The evidence indicates that he has gone to Kansas in the company of Emerald, an older black movie actress who wants to film the story of her life. Her search takes V.I. from the military base Emerald was born on, to the farm where she grew up outside a university town, ploughing up past and present-day secrets as she goes.

What is happening at the former nuclear missile site next door to the farm? What happened at the site in 1983, when students tried to stage their own version of Greenham Common? Everywhere V.I. turns she seems to be finding more trouble - with not a sign of August and Emerald. And when trouble turns to death....

Hard to believe anything could drive V. I. Warshawski out of Chicago, but here she is, in this eighteenth series entry, in Lawrence, Kansas. The case starts in Chicago, where she's hired to track down a missing film student and a black actress popular in the 1980s. The pair have headed to Kansas, the actress' childhood home, to film her life story, so V. I., along with her dog, Peppy, hits the road.

In Lawrence, V.I.'s search pulls her into conflicts with the military at nearby Fort Riley, with the county sheriff, and with a suspicious agribusiness with government connections. Racial tensions still simmer in this outwardly liberal bastion that was founded by abolitionists, and V. I., the outsider from Chicago who makes no adjustment to her brash style, is not viewed positively by anyone.

She learns of secrets, murders, and unsolved disappearances related to 1980s protests against a missile silo, and, since these turn out to be critical to her current case, she persists, putting her life in jeopardy. The result is addictive storytelling with Paretsky in fine form. Vic may not know the country, but Paretsky, who grew up near Lawrence, is on home turf. She describes the landscape and its denizens with the same affection and sharp eye with which she depicts Chicago neighborhoods.


Paretsky is at the top of her game here, evidenced by the satisfying, layered puzzle peopled by a vividly described and intriguing cast.




The Dark Hours



Losses: \$851 million: 2020 combined financial losses to scams as reported to Scamwatch, other government agencies and the big four banks (ANZ, Commonwealth Bank, NAB and Westpac).

\$143 million: Amount reported lost to Scamwatch (a 34% increase from \$107 million in 2018)

\$7224: Average loss

Top scams by loss as reported by Scamwatch:

\$61.8 million: Investment scams

\$28.6 million: Dating & romance

\$10.1 million: False billing

\$5.1 million: Hacking

\$4.8 million: Online shopping scams

\$4.8 million: Remote access scams

Age: Of those over 18 years old, losses are primarily reported by people aged 55-64 (21%), while people aged 18-24 reported the lowest number of losses (4%). Of those over 18 years old, reports are primarily filed by people aged 65 and over (21%), while people aged 18-24 file fewer reports (9%).

Gender: 78,551 reports were filed by men, totalling \$77.5 million. The most common type of scam used was an investment scam. 85,486 reports were filed by women, totalling \$63.6 million. The most common type of scam used was a dating or romance scam.

Top contact methods by reports: 41.4% of people were contacted by scammers via a phone call, with 7% of people being contacted via the internet.



FINDING THINGS ON THE CATALOGUE

- ◆ Go to www.inverell.nsw.gov.au - Click on Public Library - Click on Library Catalogue
- ◆ You can start by simply typing what you are looking for in the "Search Term" box.
- ◆ It is possible to search by TITLE (words in the name of the item), AUTHOR (words in the authors' name), SUBJECT (words that appear in the description of what the item is about), KEYWORD (words that appear anywhere in the information about the item) or SERIES (words that appear in the name of the series the item belongs to).
- ◆ Try to watch your spelling and avoid using abbreviations.
- ◆ Click on the magnifying glass.
- ◆ Your results will show the number available in each format. Eg Books View all 400 items
- ◆ Click on the title/author of the item of interest.
- ◆ You should be able to see if any items are available.
- ◆ Click on blue circle next to "More Details" to check the availability or to reserve it if it is on loan.
- ◆ If you don't get any results, check your spelling, try searching a different way- try Keyword instead of Title, or use different words to describe the Subject (Poultry for chooks, Cookery for baking).
