Manager's Message.....

Public libraries operate on one simple philosophical goal- to provide equitable access to information to all. This means that regardless of an individual's circumstances, background or beliefs, we will do our very best to provide them with the library resources and information they need. Normally, our challenges to fulfilling our philosophical obligations revolve around our ability to locate desired information, or source it in a timely and cost effective way. Sometimes what we want is simply not available, or locked away behind a paywall, or limited by onerous vendor restrictions. This year, our normal challenges were outweighed by different issues: lockdowns, health order restrictions and supply chain disruptions. Book deliveries were slowed down by global transport disruptions, staff and patrons were restricted in their movements, and people changed their habits. We as librarians have had to balance providing our services as fully as possible, whilst operating within the restrictions and guidelines that are keeping us all safe.

We have continued to build our print and digital collections, so that resources are available for patrons when restrictions are lifted. We have added new digital products (Haynes All-access Manuals, Kinderling Kids Radio and Comics Plus) to provide patrons with a wider range of resources for off-site use. We have started exciting projects (check out the Images section of our catalogue) and are planning more improvements. We are looking forward to bringing back programs that build connections, create moments of pleasure, and support our core philosophy.

2021 felt a little bit like 2020 on repeat. Just when we thought we were past the worst, another challenge came at us. It has certainly been a year where we needed to let go of expectations, keep our plans simple and flexible, call upon our reserves of resilience, and help each other whenever we could. We have learnt to value simple things like a meal with family or friends, the chance to walk in the park, or to browse the library shelves in search of a good book. For me, and many of you, the opportunity to escape into the pages of a great book has brought pleasure, distraction and comfort amidst a tumultuous year.

Whatever challenges 2022 brings, we must all remember to value those simple pleasures, to utilise our local community services whenever we can, support our local businesses and, most importantly, be kind - to ourselves and each other. I would like to wish all our valued patrons a very Merry Christmas - thank you for your continued support and understanding during these challenging times. We look forward to seeing you in the new year.



Frontline by Dr Hilary Jones


The Unhoneymooners by Christina Lauren

South Australia, 1838. A new start in an old land. God, society and nature itself decree Hanne and Thea cannot be together. But within the impossible, is devotion.




The Wish by Nicholas Sparks











DEBBIE MACOMBER


◆ **People We Meet on Vacation by Emily Henry**





From singing carols, decorating trees, leaving food and drink for Santa and his reindeers or cooking up a feast for your visitors, traditions are a great way to celebrate the festive season. Here are some holiday traditions that are practiced globally which you may find interesting.

Sweden

The Yule Goat has been a Swedish Christmas symbol dating back to ancient pagan festivals. However, in 1966, the tradition got a whole new life after someone came up with the idea to make a giant straw goat, now referred to as the Gävle Goat. According to the official website, the goat is more than 42 feet high, 23 feet wide, and weighs 3.6 tons. Each year, the massive goat is constructed in the same spot. Fans can even watch a livestream from the first Sunday of Advent until after the New Year when it's taken down.



Philippines



If you thought the United States went all out with Christmas decorations, you should see what the Philippines does. Every year, the city of San Fernando holds Ligligan Parul (or Giant Lantern Festival) featuring dazzling parols (lanterns) that symbolize the Star of Bethlehem. Each parol consists of thousands of spinning lights that illuminate the night sky. The festival has made San Fernando the "Christmas Capital of the Philippines."

Poland

On Christmas Eve in Poland, many families share opłatek (an unleavened religious wafer), each person breaking off a piece as they wish each other Merry Christmas. Dinner may not begin until the first star appears in the night sky and, traditionally, an extra setting is left at the table should someone show up uninvited.

Iceland

Similar to the 12 days of Christmas in the U.S., Iceland celebrates 13. Each night before Christmas, Icelandic children are visited by the 13 Yule Lads. After placing their shoes by the window, the little ones will head upstairs to bed. In the morning, they'll either have received candy (if they're good) or be greeted with shoes full of rotten potatoes if they're bad. And you thought coal was a terrible gift!




Japan

Although Christmas isn't a national holiday in Japan (an estimated one percent of the population is Christian, according to Smithsonian Magazine), its citizens still find an interesting and delicious way to celebrate. Rather than gathering around the table for a turkey dinner, families head out to their local Kentucky Fried Chicken. The tradition began in 1974 after a wildly successful marketing campaign called "Kurisumasu ni wa kentakkii!" or "Kentucky for Christmas!" The fast food chain has maintained its yuletide popularity, causing some people to order their boxes months in advance or stand in two-hour-long lines to get their "finger lickin' good" food.




The Netherlands




The Christmas Pine

fabulous Christmas tree!




The Robin and the Reindeer by Rosa Bailey (Junior Fiction)



Curtis Stones' The Ultimate Turkey Recipe

15m prep | 2h 45m cook | 8 servings

Ingredients

- * 4.2kg Australian Whole Turkey
- * 2 carrots, peeled, coarsely chopped
- * 2 brown onions, coarsely chopped
- * 3 celery sticks, coarsely chopped
- * 100g butter
- * 2 tsp Worcestershire sauce
- * 3 cups (750ml) salt-reduced chicken stock
- * 60g butter
- * 1/3 cup (50g) plain flour



Step 1

Preheat oven to 180°C (160°C fan-forced). Thoroughly pat turkey dry. Stuff turkey cavity with half the carrots, onions and celery. Tie turkey legs together with kitchen string. Place remaining carrots, onions and celery in a large flameproof roasting pan. Place turkey on a rack in the pan.

Step 2

In a small saucepan over low heat, melt butter with Worcestershire sauce. Remove from heat. Brush some butter mixture all over turkey. Cover pan with foil. Roast turkey for 1 1/4 hours. Uncover and baste turkey with more butter mixture. Roast, uncovered, basting with butter mixture every 20 mins, for 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 hours or until an instant-read thermometer reads 75°C when inserted into thickest part of breast.

Step 3

Transfer turkey to a carving board (don't clean out roasting pan) and rest for 20 mins before carving.

Step 4

Meanwhile, to make gravy, carefully pour liquid from the roasting pan into a small measuring cup. Set aside for 5 mins to allow fat to rise above juices. Spoon off fat, reserving pan juices.

Step 5

Heat roasting pan over medium-high heat. Add reserved pan juices and stock. Bring to a simmer, stirring to scrape up brown bits. Strain and discard solids.

Step 6

In a medium heavy saucepan over medium-high heat, swirl butter to melt. Add flour. Cook, stirring, for 2 mins. Whisk in stock mixture. Bring to a simmer. Simmer for 5 mins or until gravy thickens slightly. Season.

Step 7

Carve turkey and serve with gravy.


