Print copies of the survey are available at the library and Inverell Shire Council Administration front desk.


Otherwise you can complete it online by going to www.inverell.nsw.gov.au, click on **Public Library** and you should see the information about the survey.




The Only Survivors by Megan Miranda



From her hospital bed in Dublin, the elderly Dilly awaits the visit of her daughter, Eleanora, from London. The epochs of her life pass before her; emigrating to America in the 1920s, a romantic liaison she had there, the destiny that brought her back to Ireland, and her marriage into the stately Rusheen. She also retraces Eleanora's precipitate marriage to a foreigner, which alienated mother and daughter even more, and Dilly's heart-rendering letters sent over the years in a determination to reclaim her daughter.

Eleanora's visit does not prove to be the glad reunion that it might have been and, in her sudden departure, she leaves behind the secret journal of their stormy relationship, a revelation which brings the novel to a shocking close.



June 1815. The people of London wait breathlessly for news as Napoleon and the forces united against him hurtle toward their final reckoning at Waterloo. Among them, is Sebastian St Cyr, Viscount Devlin, frustrated to find himself sidelined while recovering from a dangerous wound he recently received in Paris. When the mutilated corpse of Major Miles Sedgewick surfaces from the murky waters of the Thames, Sebastian is drawn into the murder investigation, which threatens one of his oldest and dearest friends, Irish surgeon Paul Gibson.

Gibson's lover, Alexi Sauvage, was tricked into a bigamous marriage with the victim. But there are other women who may have wanted the cruel, faithless major dead. His mistress,

his neglected wife, and their young governess whom he seduced all make for compelling suspects. Even more interesting to Sebastian is one of Sedgewick's fellow officers, a man who shared Sedgewick's macabre fascination with both old English folklore and the occult. And then there's the valuable list of Londoners who once spied for Napoleon that Sedgewick was said to be transporting to Charles, Lord Jarvis, the Regent's powerful cousin, who also happens to be Sebastian's father-in-law.

The deeper Sebastian delves into Sedgewick's life, the more he learns about the major's many secrets, and the list of people who could have wanted him dead grows even longer. Soon others connected to Sedgewick begin to die strange, brutal deaths, and more evidence emerges that links Alexi to the crimes. Certain that Gibson will be implicated along side Alexi, Sebastian finds himself in a desperate race against time to stop the killing and save his friends from the terror of the gallows.

Lucinda Riley

Lucinda was born in 1965 in Drumbeg in Northern Ireland, living there for five years before moving to the UK. In Leicestershire, she was sent to a vocational school and began ballet lessons.

Both her mother and great-aunt were professional actresses, and her great-uncle was chief lighting designer at the Royal Opera House in London, so she grew up in a creative world. Yet it was her father who encouraged her writing – very rarely at home as he travelled the world for work, he'd arrive back suddenly, always with a gift for her from wherever he had been. Then he'd tell her stories about the places he'd visited, peppered with characters she still remembers to this day. After he died, she found them all written down in a drawer.



She married an actor she met on a TV commercial and was then struck down with what has now been diagnosed as Epstein Barr virus. Whilst stuck in bed, plagued by fatigue, she decided to begin writing down a story that had been in her head for some time. The fact that she could use her imagination to take her out of the difficult 'real' world was both a revelation, and therapy of the best kind.

A friend read the book – all 600 pages written in longhand over the months she'd been ill – and passed it to her author father, who passed it on to his literary agent. A few months later, at the age of 25, she found herself not only with a three-book deal, but also pregnant with her first child, Harry. Books, babies and a divorce with a subsequent move back to Ireland followed, renting a small cottage in Clonakilty. The decision to forget acting and write more books was easily made, because it not only fulfilled the creative, but also the cerebral side and could include her love of history, a huge part of the stories she has written since.

She moved back to England in 1998, remarried, and after having four children under nine years old, she took a break from publishing for a few years. During that time, she wrote three novels when the children were in bed. Some years later, two of these books – '*The Butterfly Room*' and '*The Olive Tree*' – were rescued from her office, re-edited and published with considerable success. The third book is Lucinda's only murder mystery, '*The Murders at Fleat House*' is now scheduled for international publication.

When the youngest children went to school, she decided it was time to write a novel that she would be brave enough to show to the publishing world. She changed her name from Lucinda Edmonds to her new married name of Lucinda Riley, not wanting to be judged on, or categorised by, what she had written fifteen years before.

Expecting nothing, she applied to do a university degree in philosophy, and was amazed when Penguin Random House bought world rights to '*Hothouse Flower*'. It subsequently became a No.1 bestseller around the globe and another four books were published to growing acclaim in the following years.

Then, in 2013, standing outside on a starry night in Norfolk, Lucinda came up with the idea of writing a seven-book series, based allegorically on the myths and legends of The Seven Sisters of the Pleiades star cluster. Her interest in Greek myths and philosophy could therefore be utilised throughout the stories, all gently peppered with anagrams and metaphor.

Her books have been nominated for numerous awards, including the Italian Bancarella prize, The Lovely Books award in Germany, and the Romantic Novel of the Year award. In 2020 she received the Dutch Platinum award for sales over 300,000 copies for a single novel in one year – an award last won by J K Rowling for Harry Potter.

Lucinda was diagnosed with cancer in 2017 and died on June 11th 2021, surrounded by her family. Her proudest moment was, after 30 years writing, '*The Missing Sister*', published only three weeks before she died, becoming her first hardback No 1 in both the UK's Sunday Times and in Ireland.

STAFF BOOK REVIEW


The Collector's Daughter by Gill Paul Reviewed Camille (Reader Services Officer)

'The Collector's Daughter' is a sweeping tale of the discovery of Tutankhamen's tomb. This is a beautifully written story of a life and a relationship dominated by events in the 1920's. Gill Paul weaves fact and fiction into a compelling story too interesting to put down. I found it a completely engaging read, which not only succeeds in giving a real and vibrant life to a woman who was an active participant in a significant historical discovery but also making her a memorable character in her own right.

The research that has gone in to '*The Collector's Daughter*' is incredible, with touches of social and political history that really bring the story to life. Brief mentions of television programmes of that era, the weather and national events mean that every word feels authentic and all the more engaging so that the story is totally immersive.

The historical transition between the 1920s and the 1970s is brought out through Eve's memories that it feels as if Eve is telling the story personally to the reader. Her feisty vivacity, her passion for archaeology and her love for Brograve, its Eve who is so pivotal in bringing the narrative to life. The strokes Eve has suffered add an extra emotional depth that I found incredibly moving as her memories shift and alter like the sands alongside the Nile.

Overall this was a fascinating story and a wonderful piece of historical fiction! I really enjoyed it. The author did a great job with the historical research and presentation in this book. If you love historical fiction and Egypt you will devour this book!




Camille





Find your way to www.inverell.nsw.gov.au and click on the 'Public Library' tab. *Please note that your library card number starts with a Capital Letter "I" for Inverell.

Getting the most from the Library Catalogue Reserving things on the Catalogue

- Go to www.inverell.nsw.gov.au Click on Public Library Click on Library Catalogue
- Once you have searched for and found the item/s you want, you may wish to RESERVE the item. You can reserve items which are on loan, or if you are accessing the catalogue from home, you can reserve items which are not on loan, for you to collect later.
- Search for the item you want to reserve.
- Click on the title to take you to the details about the item.
- Click on the blue circle next to "More Details".
- Click on the Reserve.
- If you haven't already logged into your account, you will be prompted to enter your library card number and pin. Note: your card number starts with a capital I for Inverell and is followed by six numbers.
- You will then be shown the your position in the queue and collection location.
- Click on the blue "Thumbs Up"
- You will get a confirmation message on screen when your reserve has been made.
- If the item you have reserved is on loan, we will notify you when it is returned and becomes available for you. If the item is not on loan, you will be able to collect it on the next working day after you place your reserve.
- All reserved items will be held for 10 working days for collection.
