
On a Bright Hillside In Paradise by Annette Higgs

Susannah's mother Eliza keeps watch from her chair beside the fire sharing bush lore and stories of the past. Her elder children Jack, Eddie and Echo yearn to forge stories of their own. When strangers arrive - Christian Brethren evangelists who offer hope and light in the face of hardship - the Hattons and their community are forever altered.


Told from five different perspectives, *On a Bright Hillside in Paradise* tackles big questions of family and faith but remains grounded in the dreams and strivings of its characters. Higgs takes lives that history might have judged as small and imbues them with dignity and complexity.

Lyrical, layered and moving, at its heart '*On a Bright Hillside in Paradise*' is about family, community and home-making.

Baking cakes in Kigali by Gaile Parkin

Angel Tungaraza has recently moved to Rwanda from her native Tanzania. With her husband Pius and the five orphaned children of their late son and daughter, she is hardly short of things to do. But she still finds time to pursue her passion: her small but increasingly successful business, baking individually designed cakes for the parties and celebrations of her neighbours and their friends.

As a businesswoman, Angel prides herself on behaving professionally at all times, even when facing awkward situations, ethical dilemmas and her own undignified menopausal hot flashes. And if she is occasionally manipulative, it is only ever because fairness requires it. Or because it might just win her cakes an international reputation.

Entirely aware that many of the people around her have witnessed and survived horrors she can barely imagine, Angel also knows that their lives continue, that they still find reasons for joy and celebration. As her customers tell her their stories, she comes to realise how much each of them has to mourn as well as how much they have to celebrate. And, finally she comes to accept how much that is true of her too.





The Changeling by Victor LaValle (Fantasy)

When Apollo Kagwa was just a child, his father disappeared, leaving him with recurring nightmares and a box labelled 'Improbabilia'. Now a successful book dealer, Kagwa has a family of his own after meeting and falling in love with Emma, a librarian. The two marry and have a baby: so far it's happy-ever-after.

However, as the pair settle into their new lives as parents, exhaustion and anxiety start to take their toll. Emma's behaviour becomes increasingly erratic, until one day she commits an unthinkable act, setting Apollo on a wild and fantastical quest through a suddenly otherworldly New York, in search of a wife and child he no longer recognises.

An epic novel for our anxiety-ridden times, '*The Changeling*' is a tale of parenthood, love - in its most raw and brutal form - and, ultimately, humanity.

Tom Lake by Ann Patchett (Contemporary Fiction)

This is a story about Peter Duke who went on to be a famous actor.


This is a story about falling in love with Peter Duke who wasn't famous at all.

It's about falling so wildly in love with him - the way one will at twenty-four - that it felt like jumping off a roof at midnight.

There was no way to foresee the mess it would come to in the end.

It's spring and Lara's three grown daughters have returned to the family orchard. While picking cherries, they beg their mother to tell them the one story they've always longed to hear - of the film star with whom she shared a stage, and a romance, years before.

Both hopeful and elegiac, '*Tom Lake*' explores what it means to be happy even the world is falling apart.

Meet Jennie Jones

Jennie loved anything romantic and dramatic from about age four. As a young teenager she joined amateur dramatic groups and youth theatres and found her place in the world. She then went to college to learn how to be a secretary and how to touch type (best thing she learned how to do) and can still do shorthand but only she knows what she's saying.

She gave up her career as an office worker at the heady age of eighteen and went to drama school in London where she spent three years being poor and very dramatic. Jennie then spent the next fifteen years as a professional theatre actor, working all over Britain. She was still poor but strangely contented.

When out of work as an actor, Jennie worked as a Foley Artist,

recreating sound FX for film & TV in sound studios all over London and England, including Pinewood and Twickenham. When she was 25 she wrote a Mills & Boon historical western but they didn't want it. Fortunately, she got a job in musical theatre and forgot about writing historical westerns, for which, she says, authors of historical westerns should be truly appreciative! But it was her start...and we all have to start somewhere (or start again) sometime in our lives.

Jennie's debut novel '*The House on Burra Burra Lane*' was a bestseller which was completely unexpected and led to a five book series, all bestsellers - also completely unexpected.

Jennie Jones has been professionally involved in the arts most of her life. Theatre by theatre, stage by stage and later, book by book. From Wales to London to Auckland to Australia.

Jennie lives in Perth, Western Australia and remains a countryfied girl at heart. She has a passion for stately homes and rustic cottages, is fond of collecting vintage wares, has numerous pot plants she's learning how to keep alive and is happiest when writing stories about life, love, and everything between.







Cilka's Journey by Heather Morris (Adult Fiction)

It seems almost unthinkable.

That the people who liberate you from sexual abuse at the hands of the Nazis in Auschwitz-Birkenau, find you guilty of collaborating with the enemy and sentence you to 15 years work in a Siberian Gulag.


But that is the story of Cilka Klein.

Under unspeakable cruelty, brutal conditions and the harsh almost un-survivable climate of Siberia, Cilka finds her unbreakable resilience to become a nurse and help others through one of the cruelest places on earth.

I have found Heather Morris a hard writer to read. The plots of her books are

magnificent but at times I find her writing to feel wooden and unemotional which makes it hard to connect with her characters. But perhaps that is needed for books with this kind of plot. *'Cilka's Journey'* is set in Soviet controlled Siberia, which may not be an ideal place to travel to and the descriptions of freezing to death certainly doesn't entice a person to travel there. There is not a lot of description or conversation in foreign languages which makes it an easy book outside of the English language to read.

The fact that this is based on the true stories of women in the Siberian Gulags and Cilka was a real person will make this story stay with you long after you finish it.


Sudoku Puzzle Level: Hard

Sudoku is a popular logic puzzle with numbers. Its rules are quite simple, so even beginners can handle the simple levels.

Sudoku grid consists of 9x9 spaces. You can use only numbers from 1 to 9. Each 3×3 block can contain only numbers from 1 to 9. Each vertical column can only contain numbers from 1 to 9. Each horizontal row can only contain numbers from 1 to 9. Each number in the 3×3 block. vertical column or horizontal row can be used only once.

The game is over when the whole Sudoku grid is correctly filled with numbers.

Does a monkey get grumpy? by Moira Butterfield


Ever wondered if animals have feelings, just like you?




A fact-filled and engaging book to help children identify different feelings, while teaching them the importance of caring for Earth's amazing creatures.

Getting the most from the Library Catalogue Requesting things on the Catalogue

- Go to www.inverell.nsw.gov.au Click on 'Public Library' Click on 'Library Catalogue'
- Log in to your account with your borrower number and PIN (remember your borrower number starts with a capital I for Inverell).
- Click on "Suggestions" in the top left of your screen.
- Click on the type of request you would like to complete: Suggestion for Purchase (asking the library to buy an item for the library collection) or an Interlibrary Loan (asking the library to borrow an item from another library on your behalf). Charges apply for interlibrary loans.
- Fill in as much information about the item as possible.
- Select a location to collect the item
- Click on the blue disk icon.
- You will receive a message on screen when your request has been submitted

Some requests may take some time to fulfill. If you need an item within a certain timeframe, please speak directly to staff before submitting your request. You will be notified as soon as possible when your item becomes available.
